WITH WILDLIFE-RICH WATERS, NATURE TREKS AND PRISTINE BEACHES, IT'S NOT HARD TO SEE WHY THE LIKES OF RICHARD BRANSON FELL FOR AUSTRALIA'S SUNSHINE COAST. AS LAURA HOLT DISCOVERS AROUND NOOSA

NOOSA, QUEENSLAND

David Low was certainly on to something. The local boy named state parliamentarian was the first to see the tourism potential of the Sunshine Coast, establishing a scenic coastal highway in 1929, known as the David Low Way, which knitted together a string of enviable beachside enclaves, reaching a pinnacle at Noosa.

It paved the way for the buoyant state of tourism Noosa enjoys today. But it's no surprise, really, because Noosa essentially represents the best of Queensland in a microcosm: a mix of marine-rich waters, subtropical rainforest and spectacular

coastal scenery, punctuated by bohemian, beachside towns.

On the town's main thoroughfare, Hastings Street, high-end fashion boutiques, such as Wallbank Beach and Bowery 45, line up beside artisan bakeries and coffee shops. Smart restaurants lie close by, including Beachside Bistro C, where watch whales breaching offshore, and fine-dining venue Sticky I's, where local ingredients specialise.

Indeed, it says something of Noosa's tourism credentials that (former) Australian surfer Matt Sinclair settled down for his modest restaurant, a big, neon-lit joint,

called Sun Tong Goya, which serves up handcrafted cocktails and Asian-influenced street-food dishes to a fashionable crowd.

NATURAL BEAUTY

But aside from the sun-kissed and sylvatic dimensions, left-leaning Noosa is really about getting back to nature. On the doorstep is Noosa National Park, a 16,000-acre expanse of subtropical rainforest that nudges the northern shoulder of town and wraps itself around the Pacific. There are five waymarked trails here, from the two-mile Noosa Hill Walk to the seven-mile Coastal Walk, where —

louise shelter around Tia Tia Bay. Of course, you can go alone, but I join ranger Steve Cordinger, who runs Tropical Tracks, for an expert-led excursion. Seasoned at navigating the forest, he guides us past tangled fern vines, towering hoop pines and fan-like stag-horns, as blue-wing butterflies and brown hornbills stir through the canopy.

After the exertion, I emerge hungry. But luckily, a feast awaits from the Getaway Pantry. This very Noosa,locavore-loving company sources food from resident producers to provide meals in stunning locations. In this instance, it's a picnic lunch on a white-linen tablecloth overlooking the beach, complete with hammock floor cushions. A hamper of kale, feta and squash salad, Vietnamese rice rolls and fresh strawberries arrives,

much of it grown and fatty-free, in keeping with Noosa's high-end hippy ethos.

Duly fuelled, I head off in search of another natural attraction: the Noosa Everglades. This 10-mile network of waterways is one of only two everglade systems on Earth but, unlike its Florida counterpart, it's relatively unknown.

With Australian kayaking champion Melisse Golding, of Kooka Kayaks, by my side, I ply the glassine waters, jumping off from Eucla Point to paddle across Lake Coolum. Entering narrow Kin Kin Creek, we cruise past eucalyptus and palm trees, as patrolling pelicans, whistling kites and barking cockatoos mark our passage.

ISLAND ESCAPE

At this stage, clients might feel the call of Cairns or the pull of Port Douglas. But in

Noosa, there's really no need to go north. A short charter flight from Bundaberg, Hervey Bay, Redcliffe or Cooloola heads straight to Lady Elliot Island, the most remote island of the Great Barrier Reef that's regularly accessed. The flight alone is worth the journey: as our pilot swoops over Rainbow Beach, he enthusiastically points out pods of humpback whales and dolphins.

Touching down, I'm greeted with another natural spectacle, bird season, which prevails here from October to April, when 53 species of terns, spoonbills, shorewrens and gulls have in to breed. Frigatesbirds – nicknamed 'pirates of the skies' – dive overhead; sandpipers and golden plovers patrol the airstrip.

national park, development is kept to a minimum.

To get a sense of how large the largest sand island on Earth is, it's worth noting that wild horses were only recently discovered on Fraser, more than 50 years after all non-native wildlife was thought to have been removed, as part of its Unesco listing in 1992. The dingo, cousin of the Atlantic wolf, was the only exception: having lived there so long, it was deemed to be beneficial to the ecosystem.

Joining Kingfisher's 'beauty spots' tour, I head out in a truck-size zodiac, traversing undulating sandy roads with guide Kevin, who delights in watching the grip on our water belts tighten.

From July to November, there's whale watching from Fraser. As a tip, let clients know it's best early in the season, when inquisitive adolescents come close to the boat. But travelling outside that period, ditch land-based attractions, including Lake McKenzie, with its

LIFE DOWN UNDER

In the afternoon, I head out on the island's glass-bottom boat for a snorkelling tour with guide Jess and manta-spotting skipper Timmo, who's been on the island since it opened as a resort in 1985. Telescopic manta drift by beneath us, as less po-faced turtles and sea cucumbers.

With excited and fatigued, we jump in to witness a scene straight out of *Blue Planet*: a school of manta rays leading on a trail of plankton, gliding like an army of silent giants beside me. Though the boardwalk, beach-style cabanas on Lady Elliot are simple, if experiences like this make a stay here unforgettable. Round off a bucket-list day, I settle beneath the island's lighthouse, birds circling overhead, to watch the sky turn molten red: the ultimate sundowner.

For the next of Queensland's phenomenal landscapes, I head to Fraser: the world's largest sand island. Dominated by a World Heritage-listed

health-enhancing, silica-filled waters; the Maheno shipwreck, stranded since a 1903 voyage from New Zealand; and Eli Creek, a local meeting point, where boozies gather for weekend parties. Capping it all off, I hop aboard an additional Air France flight, waiting on the 15-mile Beach, which takes the over-flow of kingpays and the island's lake-based residents.

Those who make it to Malpepace do so by boat, via a short journey from the town's marina. This is how Richard Branson first clapped eyes on Malpepace. He acquired a 90% share in the island in 2007 and went on to turn it into a private family hideaway.

Malpepace has since been transformed into a luxury island retreat. Today, almost everything on the island has been shipped in from Bali, including the flower-studded Buddha statues and the ornately carved wooden doors that open onto the main wooden (Balinese style) pavilion.

I'm here because, since 2012, Branson has extended the invite beyond his immediate circle to other would-be customers willing to pay a premium to rent

the island, for up to six people, exclusively. It delivers ultimate privacy, a short mile from the cosmopolitan delights of Noosa. You get fine sein over water sports, an attentive team of staff and an endless supply of food, created by head chef Eric Maltez and served up in several sight-worthy settings. It's the final flourish for those with budget left to spare.

Noosa's beauty and the foresight of men such as Low and Branson help shape the destination's fortunes. The town itself really is the queen of Queensland. ▶

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
